July 8/ Aug 12 Brazos River Moonlight Float Trip

The Brazos River below Lake Whitney Dam is the launch site for the Moonlight Float trips, which continue downriver about 8 miles to The Outpost (formerly Dick's Place) at FM 2114 and the Brazos River.

Gather at Riverside Park on the east side of the lake just below the dam at about 5:30 PM. There is a boat ramp and a small parking area. We will unload boats at the ramp, then shuttle vehicles down to The Outpost before we launch. Vehicle parking at The Outpost is free, but there is a fee of \$6 per boat for taking out there.

Bring dinner and beverages for yourself, a camp chair and a headlamp - we WILL be paddling after dark. Technically, we are required by law to have a white light, visible from 360 degrees, on each boat after dark. If interested contact Jerry Johnson via e-mail, or call 817-354-5395.





Canyons of the Rio Grande

Upon making ourselves presentable we drove to Chisos Basin in Big Bend National Park where we camped Thursday night. Fortunately, we were the only occupants of the group campground that night because we overflowed into three additional spaces beyond what we had reserved. The big sky of the basin gave us an excellent view of the stars as we sat in the bowl of what is probably an inactive (we hope) volcano.

On Friday morning, we awoke at about 6 AM, and began preparing for the long shuttle through open desert to the Talley Access at the top of Mariscal Canyon. Since we were running our own shuttle we had to leave early, and we departed Chisos Basin around 9:30 AM for the 3-hour drive to Talley. Stopping at Rio Grande Village, we dropped off vehicles that could not traverse the desert, restocked our ice supply, loaded everything onto the four vehicles being used for the shuttle, then headed out to begin our 2-day Mariscal Canyon trip of about 11 miles. Everything progressed smoothly according to our plan, though we were a little later getting on the river than we had anticipated. It was not a problem because we were just going a few miles into the canyon before stopping to camp for the night. After dropping our boats, gear and everybody who was not driving a shuttle vehicle at Talley, the drivers departed for the Solis Access take-out and left all but one vehicle there, using the remaining vehicle to return to Talley where the rest of us were loading boats and getting ready to go.

The only major obstacle in Mariscal Canyon is the class II to III+ Tight Squeeze Rapid, which is really just a huge boulder field very similar to Rockslide in Santa Elena Canyon. Apparently, rains since we were there last year had radically altered the landscape, and upon arriving at our Mexican side campsite we decided to paddle about a quarter mile back upriver to a Texas side campsite that was larger and more accommodating. Once situated at our overnight campsite we began preparing dinner. There were no leftovers. We sat around the campsite and gazed in awe at the beauty of Mariscal Canyon in the fading sunlight of our last night on the river.

Saturday was our eighth day on the river for those of us who started at Colorado Canyon, and we were sad to see our trip approaching its end. We had a leisurely morning, sleeping later than on most mornings before getting about the tasks of preparing breakfast and striking camp. We still had

a 2-hour shuttle back to Rio Grande Village awaiting us after we reached the Solis Access take-out. We loaded our boats, then began our final 7 miles of the trip, working our way carefully through Tight Squeeze, which it really was in low water, then enjoying the scenery as we approached the end of Mariscal Canyon.

Upon arrival at Solis we loaded boats and gear onto our trailer and second shuttle vehicle while two of our drivers returned to Talley to retrieve the other vehicle. Upon their return we loaded the two remaining vehicles, then set out for Rio Grande Village where we set up camp for Saturday night and began

cooking a dinner that everybody devoured as if they had not eaten in a month. Most of the group never even set up tents, preferring instead to just sleep on the ground under the stars.

Sunday morning brought the end of our trip. We struck camp, drove to Chisos Basin and had breakfast at the lodge there, then bade farewell to each other before departing for our respective destinations. Another successful and exciting trip was on the books, and I think that we all hated to have to return home. Those of us who are Rio Grande veterans never fail to be enticed to return, and hopefully those who had never been here before caught the same fewer. I am certain that several of us will be paddling the Rio Grande again before the end of this year if there is adequate water for a good trip. I am happy to have been on this trip with so many good people, and to have shared a moment in their lives. As diverse as our various backgrounds are, we all have one thing in common we love and appreciate the infinite beauty of nature and the thrill of paddling and camping along a gem of a river - the Rio Grande!

Memorial Day Trip on the Lower Mountain Fork and Little River

Every time we do one of these trips, I wonder why we don't canoe camp more often. Our group of 8 boats met at Ambush on the Lower Mountain Fork Saturday morning to get the boats loaded and run our shuttle down to the Horatio, Ar takeout. The normal tubing and canoe rental crowd up there must be pretty late sleepers as we pretty much had the place to ourselves save for a group of jon boats that were doing their own overnight trip. We finally got on our way around 11am, by then the river was starting to get a little crowded, but it did not take us very long to pull away from the pack. John K., Rick Schell and I were fishing our way down the river, Thomas was trash pickin' his way down and Marc, Carolee, Brett, Lige and Marion were just cruising.

We all got back together a mile or two down the river to have lunch by a swift, but not too dangerous bend in the river. As we munched we watched a troop of Boy Scouts negotiate the bend. Nobody was hurt, but it just proves my theory that there is nothing you can tell a thirteen year old boy that he does not already know. My sympathies to Scout leaders everywhere.

Fishing was pretty slow due to the noise and river traffic until we got about six miles down river. The Boy Scouts had stopped to camp, the Jon boats had passed us and headed to their evening stop and our own river cruisers had paddled on, leaving just us fishermen behind to hopefully bring home dinner. Things started picking up, Rick hauled in a few pan size bass, I caught a few includ-

ing one that went close to four pounds and John K. was locked in a ferocious battle (thanks to a very loose drag setting) with another bass of over two pounds. With our cooler getting pretty full, we decided it was time to catch up to the rest of the group.

We reached the confluence of the Little River and headed east and finally caught up with the group, who were busy setting up camp on a gravel island. Any snide comments about our fishing ability were quickly silenced after everyone got a look into our fish cooler.

Dinner that night featured freshly fried fish and homemade chips as well as a selection of assorted goodies that everyone had brought as backups "just in case". We built a small fire and sat up watching the stars. It was such a warm dry night that most of us left the rain flys off of our tents so we could see the stars all night, a really neat idea until the sun starts coming up.

Needless to say I was up early Sunday to try a little more fishing, but all I succeeded in doing was loosing tackle, so I gave up in favor of a hot cup of coffee. We watched as some of the locals speed by in their boats heading up and down the river to check their trot lines and fish pots. The one negative thing that I can say about this stretch of the river is that the local power boaters have very little respect for paddlers, so do not look for them to slow down as the pass you. You will be bobbing on boat wakes from time to time.

We got on the river about 9:30 and crossed into Arkansas in the early afternoon. A few miles into Arkansas we officially saw something that none of us had seen before. It seems that the



good folks out there have invented a new form of watercraft, the floating stock tank. They are super easy to build. Just head over to Tractor Supply, pick out the correct size, add a few kitchen chairs and an ice chest and presto you have a party machine! When I asked if the had ever attempted to motorize one, one good 'ol boy told me, "yep, but ya caint put it on the back, ya gotta put it on the front". This may explain why they were all drifting apparently none of them could determine exactly where the front of a round stock tank is. We camped

that night on a small island a little upriver from the stock tank takeout point.

Monday's paddle to the takeout was short and we were off the river by noon. Our total trip was just under 26 miles, not bad for a three day paddle. The takeout at Horatio is excellent and the drive back up to Ambush takes only about a half hour. We have decided to do this trip every Memorial Day weekend . Hope you can join us next year. There are two more canoe camping trips scheduled this summer. An overnight on the Kiamichi in July and another trip back up to the Lower Mountain Fork for a shorter one night trip in August. As many of the parks and campgrounds that we have frequented over the years have become crowded and noisy, it is certainly a pleasure to get out and enjoy the peace, quiet and big starry skies that you can only find out and away from everyone and everything. Like I said earlier, I don't know why we got away from canoe camping, but the extra effort is well worth it. — Bryan Jackson






Campin' Cuisine

Lige forwarded me this recipe for Ziploc Omelets. It's a great idea, we should try it on an upcoming trip.

YOU NEED: 2 eggs, a quart size Ziploc bag, Omelet filling of your choice, 2 quarts boiling water DIRECTIONS

- 1. Crack two eggs in a quart size Ziploc bag. (if using more than two eggs use larger bag)
- 2. Add your choice of omelet fillings (ham, green peppers, cheese, etc.)
- 3. Remove all air from the bag and zip it up.
- 4. Bring 2 quarts of water to a rolling boil in a large pan or dutch oven.
- 5. Drop the bag in and cook for thirteen minutes (no more -no less)
- 6. Carefully remove the bag from the water. Allow it to cool enough to be handled and remove your omelet from the bag.
- 7. Enjoy!
